

<u>Note to the editors of our fanzine trades</u>: did you know that the news here is offered to you as something you can reprint? Or as a suggestion of the kind of content you might include, from *BCSFAzine* and from other sources?

This issue I was going to pontificate some more on the Aurora Awards, <u>encourage some of you to stand for the Canadian Unity Fan Fund</u>, or propose that BCSFAns invent a faster-than-light drive, based on the speed of rumour; and I'm *still* thinking about the abrupt appearance of a self-declared Satanist, in the news that Felicity forwarded to this clubzine.

The reason I was going to pontificate about the Auroras will become clear, later in this issue: most times that I looked at Aurora Fan Achievement award winners are, I had to wonder, "who the hell is this?". No Canadian fans have spread the news, who the other fans in Canada are! So I went to some effort this January to look up the fan activities eligible for Aurora nomination, and to list them in the extended PDF version of this issue. (It was interesting to see how many Canadian fan groups we had never known about before.)

The Aurora nomination ballot is already up at www.sentex.net/~dmullin/aurora/, and the list of potential nominees should be posted by the time you read this. I encourage our trades to obtain the ballot and the list.

About the same time I heard again from Lyndie Bright. Lyndie, as you may recall, is the nice lady in Winnipeg who is the current administrator of the Canadian Unity Fan Fund. The Canadian Unity Fan Fund exists to assist a deserving Canadian active fan each year to travel to the Canvention at the opposite side of the country. Lyndie wants to

post a new CUFF Web page, in a number of places, and I will help by posting her information at www.ven.bc.ca/~hrothgar/cuff.htm.

(See how everything hangs together?)

And now for something completely different: I want to ask all of you, again, who is a current BCSFA member and who is not? I wonder about this every time I run the birthday list, and realize that many if not all of the birthday boys and girls are not members anymore. I wonder again every time I look around at FRED, and try to figure out how many, if any, of the faces are current members. So I've run a list of names in the extended PDF email version of this issue.

Also: no-one has passed on to me, even after fifteen years, what the backgrounds are for over half the BCSFA members! Now you know why I just make up stuph about you members: to provoke you to respond! It hasn't worked, obviously.

A strange thing: the older I get, the more I write and talk like an old-fashioned, literate, but rather stuffy British guy, like that butler Higgins on the 1970s TV series, *Magnum PI*. This is strange because the most similar real-life character to Higgins that I knew was my grandfather, and unlike him, I'm a Canadian baby-boomer and I never served in any armed forces. (Also he looked twenty or thirty years older than the Higgins character, who had to be the *same* age, but let's get past that.)

However, as some of you have realized, I do approach life more and more like a time-traveller, from at least thirty years ago. The daily news, ordinary street scenes, even some kinds of dress and cuisine strike me as surreal, or a put-on of questionable taste and humour. I can adapt to no-smoking zones and even the concept of gay marriage, but seeing *street beggars in modern North American cities* ... still throws me off balance.

Some of you also realize I live with the chronic feeling of false assumptions being commonly made, and of simple concepts lacking in our everyday culture. Occasionally I can verbalize something that sounds off-the-wall at first, but may be a keystone for you, a "word fitly spoken".

One of the false assumptions may be the way North Americans tend automatically to cast any event in terms of fault, or credit, right or wrong; another may be the way we cast public issues into "right" or "left" terms, or in American, "conservative" or "liberal". Whatever the biases of commercial media are, it does seem to be established that some news doesn't get much play. (Ask the B.C. Civil Liberties people, or Project Censored in California.)

So ... For at least a year I've been thinking it over, and I think it may be time to start a new publication, probably online. Call it *Interesting Times*, perhaps. An independent news commentary, taking the view that some of the news isn't important (sports and entertainment, say) and some of it can't be taken seriously, or even taken as sane.

Of course this isn't particularly original. Columns like "Curious Times", "News of the Terribly Odd", and "This Is True" have been illustrating a similar point for years, about the apparent demise of so-

called "common sense", not to mention TV shows like *This Hour Has 22 Minutes* and *The Daily Show.* But it can't hurt both to inject a sardonic sense of humour, and to attempt to restore a balanced, rational view. What say?

Lloyd Penney wrote:

"I know some of the folks at Space:TIS. Mark Askwith [producer of Prisoners of Gravity, on which Lloyd once appeared! - FW] is a producer, Lyla Miklos purchases some of the shows, and Don Wright used to be the face of Space on SpaceNews; he now works at the television station in Barrie, north of Toronto. Both Mark and Lyla have been involved with fandom to one degree or another, and they both know much of local fandom. They have never done the things they've wanted to do; Space is a channel meant to sell advertising geared to the usual SF-watching demographic. They buy a few new shows, but it is mostly reruns, over and over again. Management's intent is not to cover the world of SF or of the space programme, for that matter. They do the latter better than the former. They do not cater to any special group. They are there to sell advertising, and they do a good job of it. I wish they did a better job of producing a science fiction channel, and I think Mark and Lyla wish that, too. They can do only what they are allowed to do."

I don't quite get why Space: TIS isn't involved in cons. I would expect them to be sending a trade show type booth around to every event in the country, whipping up fans into a frenzy about seeing such astounding feats of Canadian made cinematic prowess as *H.G. Wells' The Shape of Things To Come*. (Currently, my vote for the worst SF movie ever made. If anybody thinks they can come up with something even worse, maybe we could stage a "Battle of the Turkeys" at VCON this year.) For that matter, I'm surprised that Space doesn't offer to host video rooms at cons. They've got the rights, after all, and if they manage to entice more eyeballs to the channel, they get to charge more for said ads.

((The question answers itself, if you turn it inside out: why should Space get involved in cons? To quote the much-quoted Heinlein, whenever you are inclined to ask "why don't they ..." the answer is usually "money". In this case, Space: TIS executives presumably don't perceive science fiction fans as a great untapped source of money, therefore not worth the effort of marketing to them.

((Of course their perception can be quite wrong, and maybe these executives are suffering from "terminal craniorectal inversion", as I call it.

But without doing a lot of research, or being intimately acquainted with fandom, they aren't going to get a realistic appraisal of their market.

((What is such market research, or active involvement in cons, worth to STIS? Some of the bigger conventions may be gathering-places for editors and writers and visual-industry professionals, and worth something as a place to shmooze, but not a lot of these conventions are in Canada. Usually.))

"I would have to check my old convention lists, but I believe there was an [Ontario] attempt at a Transformers convention. It was imaginatively called TransformersCon, and I think it was to be held in Oakville, southwest of Toronto. Not being a [Transformers] fan, and certainly not attending every local convention on my lists, I don't know if this actually took place. I think in this case, a Transformers convention is simply a gettogether of TransFans to meet, show off collections, and watch episodes. Not much for us jaded types, but a lot for these people, I would imagine."

As it happens, there's an event called "TransformersCon 2005" (http://www.transformerscon.com/) scheduled for Toronto on March 26th, but I don't know if it's run by the same party or parties responsible for the event which Lloyd remembers. (Why do I know this? Because it's listed on the VCon web site. In fact, the VCon web site lists fannish events clear across the country. The webmaster is obviously on some kind of Canadian nationalism kick or something.)

((Hey, if we're going to do this nation-state thing, we could at least try to do it <u>right</u>. Like be aware of the rest of our country, that is, if only to assess our resources, and what we need them for ...

((And then there's this Aurora Awards thing. One of the big laughs here is that French-Canadians had already established several SF and fantasy awards, years before the anglais got their act together, and the anglais rarely knew the eligible French-language works at all well. Another big laugh is that the Aurora Awards were intended to "spotlight" Canadian SF and fantasy, bring publicity to them, while the awards themselves were not adequately publicized, certainly not in the first five years.))

Randy Barnhart wrote:

"Yes, SF&F are becoming popular genres, which may be why some long-time fen are predicting it is dying. Many pro SF&F writers seem to have begun writing for that big audience out there instead of the tiny audience in here (i.e., fandom). This is not to say that's a bad thing, because pros write for a living and who among us would not to make a few more bucks. Still, sometimes you have to walk that razor's edge between writing any old crap for a buck and writing for a very small, sharply defined and poor group."

I think there's just a wee bit of nostalgia going on here. As the Turkey Readings at VCon should have amply demonstrated by now, there has always been rubbish SF&F. We just tend to remember the good stuff and forget the bad stuff, so when we look at what's on the shelves (which is more often rubbish than not), we tend to think that the level of quality is going downhill, when the fact is that what gets published has *always* been more often rubbish than not. (In fact, what I want to know is just how bad the stuff is which never even makes it out of the slush pile, given the rubbish which actually makes it into print. If managed to get our hands on the really putrid stuff, the Turkey Readings might raise even more money for CUFF than they already do.)

"Really? VCon 30 will be at the Executive Inn Airport Plaza?": Um, that would be a definite maybe, Randy. The concom hasn't even taken a vote on the issue yet, let alone signed a contract. What was actually reported at the concom meeting which Ray attended was that the Executive Inn offered VCON a better deal than the Hilton did. (However, I think it's only fair to say that that isn't saying much.) At this point, the only thing I can say for sure about the location of VCON 30 is that it's almost certain to be in BC. :-)

I have little doubt that, in aggregate, BC fans are in possession of an astounding array of books, zines, memorabilia, costumes, etc., but nobody's going to donate anything unless they know that it's going to be looked after properly and displayed for other fans to enjoy, and no institution is going to provide the space for storage and display without a really impressive collection to make it worth their while. It's a sort of chicken-and-egg thing. (The institution I have in mind is SFU, of course, because Science World and UBC will both be soaked by the next tsunami, and I, for one, don't relish the thought of working through thousands of books with a blow dryer.)

((Well, while we're at it, why don't we all chip in and found a BCSFA clubhouse? A permanent home for our archives? An ongoing volunteer group for Science World and/or the Museum of Anthropology? ... WCSFA has only this one standing committee. If WCSFA ever again (for example) sponsored Westercon it would strike a 2nd standing committee for the Westercon concom to operate out of.

"BCSFA is a fan social club that was instrumental in starting VCON long ago and many of whose members help/have helped to put on the yearly convention (please note that it's the MEMBERS -Not- the organization that do the helping.) In the same regard - the membership of BCSFA is considered to be one of the founding groups behind WCSFA and BCSFA members are automatically considered to hold WCSFA membership by right. This is the MEMBERSHIP of BCSFA that has WCSFA membership, Not BCSFA-the-organization. Therefore, BCSFA is NOT a standing committee of WCSFA (although for a brief period, as an experiment, it was).

"There was also an experiment to change the operating name of WCSFA to 'The V-Con Society'. (The change was never legally registered with Victoria.) The experiment died after spreading a lot of confusion. *There is NO V-Con Society*; there is only WCSFA. WCSFA's membership

<u>Andromeda and Enterprise Bite the Dust</u>: Two of the last few space-based episodic science fiction series, *Star Trek: Enterprise* and *Andromeda*, have been cancelled by their respective studios.

Enterprise is being cancelled because of lower-than-expected ratings and a twenty percent loss of viewership when placed against The Collector in the Pacific time zones. I blame Paramount's decision to have Scott Bakula as the captain of the Enterprise. If they had gone for a stronger actor in the role, the series would have survived. Executive producer Rick Berman says he will not be shopping the show to another network. UPN and Paramount are not saying when another new Star Trek series will hit the air, but with Enterprise's dismal track record they may be taking a few years off. In the



interim, UPN is replacing *Enterprise* with *The Making of a Male Model* (yes, I'm going to be sick) and trying to change their image to attract young, urban, black viewers to the network. Interesting fact: with the end of production of *Enterprise*, all the *Star Trek* franchises combined are tied with *Doctor Who* for the number of episodes produced.

Andromeda is a different case. Its ratings were good and for a while there was talk that they might continue after the one hundred and ten episodes under their original contract. However in mid-December UPN and Fox started to offer their affiliates (to coin a phrase) an offer they couldn't refuse. For UPN, it was the chance to rebroadcast episodes of the three CSI franchises while for Fox it was a chance to rebroadcast season one of The OC. This left Andromeda with only about ten percent of their syndicated affiliates. With the high cost of producing a space-bound series like Andromeda, they decided to pull the plug. Any fans who still hope to see Trance Gemini ride the West Coast Express when she's her alter-ego (Laura Bertram) will be greatly disappointed because she's moved back to Toronto. That means you'll have to ride the GO Train.



As Brian Dubberly recently pointed out, J. Michael Straczynski is fighting an uphill battle with the greedy brass at Time Warner over the *Babylon 5* theatrical movie. JMS wants to keep the original cast (with the exception of Richard Biggs, of course). However, the people at Time Warner feel that the movie would do a lot better with a more experienced, big-screen cast than J. Michael's TV actors, so the production is currently at a standstill. Fan support is quite high for JMS, and all kinds of campaigns are underway to stop the cast change from happening. Also playing into this is J. Michael's new series, *Dreamscape*, which

because of the troubles with the *B5* movie has been put on indefinite hold. This is still a developing story, so, as they say on TV, stay tuned.

Not too much happening in the pilot category. ABC has ordered a new series from Shaun Cassidy (creator of *American Gothic* and the never-seen *Hollyweird*). The only thing known about it is that it's set in a small Florida town after a category five hurricane and weird things start to happen. The other upcoming pilot is an updating of the 1970s classic science fiction series *Kolchak: The Night Stalker*. And that's about it for pilots.



Meanwhile, co-creator/producer/director/writer J.J. Abrams is already thinking up plans for the next season of the hit series *Lost*, or as I call it, *Mysterious Island on Acid*. As you probably know, during February sweeps, at least one of the characters buys the farm. Note: I'm writing this about three days before the episode airs, and since I don't own a working TARDIS, I don't know who's going to be dead. I do know the series is going to be full of all kinds of secrets being revealed even before *this* season ends.

OK, Garth's going to kill me for this, but I have to tell you some more *Doctor Who* news.

The BBC is setting firm on the date of March 26th for the new series premiere. Over here in Canada, the CBC said that it would have liked to air the first episode here on the same date, but the time slot is already committed to the new Little House on the Prairie pilot. (There's a conspiracy here, isn't there?) Since Little House will attract approximately twelve times as many viewers as Doctor Who, the suddenly-Hockey-Nightin-Canada-less network would do anything to make a few bucks. However, they're investigating the possibility of airing the first episode right after Little House on the Prairie, or airing Doctor Who Tuesday nights in the *This Is Wonderland* time slot. The CBC is saying that they have no plans to start airing the new *Doctor Who* series until after April 10th. This is barring the chance that NHL hockey returns. Still, seventeen days isn't long to wait (Hey! We've been waiting fifteen years, four months and fifteen days for a new series; seventeen more days will not kill us, and if it does, you should have had a life in the first place.) CBC's main rival CTV is also playing a big part in this because CBC programming execs are waiting to look at what their main competition will provide to compete with the new series. Note to the CBC: Please, no Summer Festival! So far no US takers for Doctor Who: however, one should be announced in the next few weeks. The parent company of Britain's Dinky Toys has signed a contract with the BBC to make miniatures based on the characters on the new series. Another company likely to make products for the more serious collector is Dragon Models, who is negotiating with the BBC to make twelve-inch dressable action figures of the Doctor and Rose as well as quite a few of the monsters made famous

by the series, and very likely a scale model of the TARDIS. Meanwhile, the American NBC network gave the good Doctor some wacky free advertisement. On the February 5th instalment of *Saturday Night Live*, guest host Paris Hilton introduced a segment on phone sex for SF/fantasy fans; it featured genre-based jokes on *Star Trek* and *Lord of the Rings* to name a few. Hilton ended the skit by saying "Operators are standing by. Who knows, one of them might be me. Does *Doctor Who* turn you on, baby? Well, I'm getting into my TARDIS right now. Oooh! I'd better put on my big floppy hat and scarf. I hope I don't find any Daleks here. Are you a Dalek, baby? Do you want to exterminate me? Call today."

Space: The Imagination Station recently showed clips from the new Fantastic Four film, including a little behind-the-scenes footage. With special effects, the Brooklyn Bridge looks very real, but with just a blue screen behind it you can see it's not as big as it's supposed to be...but it's still pretty big. They also have some behind-the-scenes shots of the cast relaxing on the streets of Vancouver. The release date for this film was set for July $4^{\rm th}$ but has been moved to July $8^{\rm th}$.

The locally-produced retelling of Battlestar Galactica has been renewed by the Sci-Fi Channel. The new series is performing very well in its time slot. (Maybe UPN could end Star Trek: Enterprise by having Starbuck mistake them for a Cylon ship and blow them away, because that what's happened in real life in the TV ratings.) It's unclear how many episodes will be in season two; however, according to Ain't It Cool News, show runner Ron Moore would like to dive deeper into the series' religious themes (on Galactica they have more than one God) and open up the world of the Cylons more. Most BCSFA members have mixed feeling on the new retelling of Galactica; even here in the Media File newsroom it's split between Felicity and me. Still, the two series were made in two different times (1978 and 2005). In the original show Starbuck was a very over-the-top male ace Viper pilot; in the new show Starbuck is a slightly over-the-top female Viper pilot. Though the original show brought in female Viper pilots early on in the series, there were none at the start, mostly because the American armed forces had no female fighter pilots. Today female fighter pilots are becoming quite common in most of the world's armed forces. The two series reflect the times in which they were made and should be judged on this in characters, storytelling, and FX.

And now a new feature I'm adding to the column. Note: I'm not being paid by the studios to do this. I just want to let you know when the new DVDs are coming out. March 1st: Exorcist: The Beginning; 20,000 Leagues Under the Sea; The Adventures of Baron Munchausen; Alien Lockdown; Angels and Demons Revealed. March 8th: Charly; Andromeda (season 4). March 15th: The Incredibles; Star Wars: Episode I—The Phantom Menace; Red Dwarf, Series 5 and 6; Sword of Doom. March 22nd: Finding Neverland; Star Wars: The Clone Wars, Volume 1. March 29th: Astro Boy: The Complete Series; Crimson Rivers: Angels of the Apocalypse.

The 1983 TV movie *The Day After* has been out on DVD since November 2003 (the film's twentieth anniversary). However, it was not

the director's cut I've been talking about over the past year or so, and that was likely the reason it was in the under \$10 bin at Best Buys. Before we start pointing fingers at Disney once again, I must say, we should point not at them, but at the Sci-Fi Cannel and Space: The Imagination Station. Disney had to sell ABC's film division (the film's producer) to MGM in 1994 as part of its takeover of that American network. MGM then sold the broadcasting rights to the film to both Sci-Fi and then-upstart Space in 1997, in a ten-year/four-broadcast deal. Part of this deal was that MGM is not to release a home video/DVD version of the film that would have different content then the ones airing on the two cable outlets in North America, until January 1st, 2007. (Note: Damn it, Felicity, I'm a sci-fi fan, not an entertainment lawyer!) Still, who knows, maybe one of our members living in Great Britain, Australia or New Zealand can get the director's cut in their homeland. (Do you mind buying us a copy and mailing it to us?)

That's all for now. See you next month, when I possibly will have a Norwescon report as well as many other interesting tidbits from the world of science fiction media. Until then, be seeing you.

A MESSAGE FROM JOE DEMARTINO TO ALL B5 FANS! A Call to Arms

Some of you may have heard the recent rumours about the upcoming "B5" feature film, "The Memory of Shadow" - how the money people are talking about recasting many of the roles from the original series with "name" actors.

I am here to tell you that this rumour is TRUE and that unless the powers that be are convinced that tinkering with the cast will hurt them in the pocketbook, they will do what they want to do, without regard to JMS's wish or ours. The only people in a position to CONVINCE them that there's money on the line are US.

WE are the ones who watched the show in great enough numbers to keep it on the air for 5 years. WE are the ones who made the reruns and "B5" S5 such a success on TNT that they spent millions of dollars on two extra TV movies and a half season of CRUSADE before they pulled the plug on that show for reasons of network politics as much as anything else. WE are the ones who lobbied and wheedled and threatened until a very sceptical Warner Bros. FINALLY released the series, the movies and ultimately CRSUADE on DVD - and then bought the DVDs in such numbers that the studio decided to make this feature film in the first place.

WE are the ones who will provide the all-important opening weekend opening box office and the initial word-of-mouth. It is perfectly true that a feature film like this can't succeed if only the hardcore fans go to see it. It will have to attract non-fans, folks who have never even HEARD of the series. But if WE don't make sure the film "opens" it won't stay in theatres long enough for non-fans to discover the film. If WE don't provide the positive word-of-mouth the film won't succeed.

I've heard that some fans don't believe the rumour, that recasting the roles seems so obviously stupid and counter-productive that they don't think Warner Bros. would ever do such a thing. I was sceptical myself when I first plugged into the 'net after an absence of several month (hurricanes are SUCH a bother) But I've since checked with a few individuals whom I trust implicitly and who are in a position to know about such things. They assure me the rumours are true. The studio is pressing for this, and since they write the checks, there isn't a lot the production office can do about it.

I've also heard that other fans are so upset about the reported story line or indications that a given actor or character may not be in the film that they're not interested in the project at all. Big mistake. Some have even suggested that the story line and the cast changes are part and parcel of the same thing - that the studio dictated a story that prominently featured new characters and reduced the old ones to cameos that could be cast with "name" actors as part of some deep, dark plot to remake "B5" in some new image of their choosing.

WRONG.

I don't know the story line for the new film. But I DO know that it is the story that JMS chose to pitch to the studio for the FIRST "B5" FILM. Did I just say "First 'B5' film"?

Yes, I did.

Everybody wants this film to succeed. If it succeeds, WB will want a sequel, the studios always do. If they do a sequel JMS can do a story that uses the original characters more. Everybody signing up to do the sequel to a successful movie will get a bigger payday than they did on the first. Maybe it makes more sense to do something that ties up some of the

threads from CRUSADE and RANGERS in movie #1, with the original cast in supporting roles. Then do the Teep War or some other story in movie #2. But this only works if the original CAST plays the original characters in movie #1.

And that's where you all come in. We need you to write letters - real, snail-mail, PRINTED and hand-signed letters, to get the attention of the folks holding the purse strings. We need to remind them that ultimately we, too, hold the purse strings. We buy the tickets at the box office.

An ad hoc committee of fans has been working on ways to get the studio's attention, including press releases and getting stories into the mainstream press. You can help by participating in a letter writing campaign with a bit of a gimmick to help it stand out from similar campaigns. Go to www.keepb5alive.com. Download one of the "B5 Bucks" designs on the site. Print them out, cut them out, and include them with your letter. We've also provided form letters that you can hand-write your own address and comments on, but I have to tell you the studios pay a lot more attention to individuals who took the time to compose a letter of their own than those who merely signed a form letter that somebody else wrote. Just don't forget to include the "B5 Bucks" whichever you do.

This may seem like a silly gimmick. So were the Budweiser frogs. Silly gimmicks are memorable, they get attention. They WORK. So can this if Warner Bros. gets socked with THOUSANDS and THOUSANDS of letters containing these novelty items. And that's the key - make them realize that this isn't an issue that concerns only a few fanatical fans of particular actors but something the vast majority of the fan community cares DEEPLY about and that we will have to consider whether or not the "B5" movie WB eventual puts in theatres is REALLY "B5" or some pale comparison that we, as loyal fans, can and will rightly ignore. Go to the site, download the materials, join the fight. The casting decisions are being made RIGHT NOW. The countdown to the start of shooting has begun. The window during which we can make our voices heard is closing, but it HASN'T CLOSED YET. Don't let it close until you've added your voice to the chorus.

Print out a letter, preferably one you've written yourself, today. Sign it, add a hand-written note and your address if necessary. Print out an envelope, stuff it, with some B5 Bucks, seal it, put it on the counter with your car keys. Make sure you mail it TOMORROW.

We've been here before folks. Our backs against the wall, no chance in hell of getting what we want. We've been here every single season, we were here at the end of S4 most of all. We were here trying to get the show released on some form of home video and ultimately on DVD. We were here trying to get a feature film off the ground AT ALL. We've always tried to do the impossible and we've always been told that we never could. (One SF entertainment news web site won't run a story on this controversy because they haven't seen an official announcement of the film from WB and they don't believe that anybody is ever going to make a feature film based on a "little" cult show like "B5")

We've ALWAYS succeeded in the long run.

Faith manages. Start writing. Joe (?)

Another Kaffeeklatsch

transcribed by Garth Spencer and Kathleen Moore-Freeman

A freestyle brainstorming party held monthly at Garth's place; this edition, January 29, 2005.

Present were Ray Seredin, Doug Finnerty (briefly), Kathleen Moore-Freeman, Barb Dryer, and James Stewart Smyth.

Due to the small turnout, or the turn that the following questions took, the declared intent of holding a fanzine-focused Kaffeeklatsch came to nothing.

1. Under what circumstances would you consider leaving your country of birth to be an act of treason, and/or morally wrong?

Ray suggested it would be wrong, for someone who received a government grant for his/her education. (A whole lot of Canadians get their education here, but move abroad; Quebec is proposing to require scholarship-supported doctors to serve rural/northern communities for a term; a rush of American applications for Canadian immigration followed the recent U.S. presidential election.)

Stewart said "what if *shari'a* law is adopted ...?" (which has actually been proposed, in Canada, as an option for some Muslim citizens.)

Barb asked, "In whose opinion? The public's? The government's?" and "What is 'selling out your country'?" Ray told the story of the A.V. Roe aircraft engineers and technicians who had worked on the famous Avro Arrow (the 1950s Canadian-designed jet, with effectively 1970s-grade engineering, which never went into production due to the cowardice and deceit of the Diefenbaker administration) and who, subsequently, left Avro and Canada to go abroad. Many of them went to the United States, and indeed into NASA's Apollo program. (Of course this meant Garth sounded off on "the Canadian tradition of industrial pusillanimity", as he describes it, in the face of any foreign competition.)

Kathleen joked about the Governor-General going diving in the tropics to miss the investiture of Parliament, and taking the black rod with him. (You have to have served in a Model Parliament to get this joke.)

2. How furry is too furry? Would you rather be a catgirl or a lioness?

Garth and Stewart confessed that the question was not immediately meaningful; it had to be explained to them. Ray talked about VCon, and solidarity among fans, and a discussion of suicidal congoers ensued. For no very clear reason Garth launched into his theory that North America is the battleground for a commercial war between the Starbucks empire, the Evil Wal-Mart Empire, and those dollar stores for cheap commercial goods, which (he maintains) are a front for our colonization by the "Middle Kingdom".

3. Do songwriters deliberately write lyrics like "shake it, shake it, shake it, shake it" so that women will shake it on the dance floor?

Stewart said, "Basically, yes." Barb said something indistinguishable. Garth failed to observe that he never realized pop songs *had* any lyrics understandable in English.

4. From 1993-2003 I worried a lot about politics, conspiracy theories, civil rights, the economy, the environment ... now I have more immediate, pressing concerns in my personal life. I sometimes worry that while I'm not looking, the former will sneak up and affect the latter. (This appeared to be in Felicity Walker's handwriting)

Discussion ensued on which "big threats" are American, and which are more Canadian. (Kathleen was taking notes while I took a coffee break, and I think she meant what an American anticipates as a threat, versus a Canadian.) Reminiscence ensued about #666 at VCon, i.e. John Turner. (I'm blessed if I know what *that* means.) Barb discoursed on the "surprise" changes in the accustomed environment: e.g. how businesses change hours, or go away, how building disappear, or appear ... [this constituting a low-key threat, I suppose, by way of an unwelcome surprise coming up and biting you; such a change of hours at one bank explains why we still haven't transferred WCSFA signing authority to current executives, because not everybody who must show up *can* get to the branch when it is open.) Ray talked about similar low-key problems, represented on a travel route on his home island. Stewart talked about the topography of West Vancouver defeating local industry there. (Garth didn't understand the reference to local history.)

5. When did clubs like ours stop meeting in rec. centres and library meeting rooms, and why? (Maybe we discussed and answered this already ...)

Stewart guessed that this happened sometime in the 1990s. Garth and Kathleen did not recall BCSFA ever meeting in rec. centres (sometimes in library meeting rooms). Discussion ensued about different club histories, e.g. SFAV (Victoria) and ESFCAS (Edmonton) ... the

bottom line being, community centre policies change, and therefore, their affordability as a venue, to SF clubs.

6. If in the next few years, a space plane that can do at least four orbits of the Earth and departs/arrives from any large airport becomes reality ... would you spend \$5,000.00 American on a three-hour return flight into near space?

Of course this wandered way off topic, too. We discussed wanting to put old computer technology into a museum; the purpose and style of Kaffeeklatsch (Ray came up with the near-pun "coffee crash"); a definite "Yes" to the question from Kathleen and Barb, and Stewart declaring that \$5,000 U.S. is peanuts for such a flight. Viewing the Earth from near space might alter people's perspectives about our planet – it was mindaltering for astronauts.

Garth let people know at this point that his housemates requested we wrap up early this night.

7. Do you feel that Vancouver area firefighters should know how to take down the poles on a trolley bus when an emergency is taking place on it, so other trolley buses may pass it?

Eligible for Fannish Achievement: Publication (non-clubzine)

(NOTE: I am including apazines and fannish websites, along with personal zines, as being forms of periodically-updated publication.)

APAplexy, c/o Liz Holden, is an APA in Ottawa. An APA, for those of you unfamiliar with the term, is an amateur publication association: X many

fans write a page or two on a regular basis, make copies, and a central mailer or editor collates the copies and sends them out. APAs have been set up to discuss a number of special interests, comics or James Bond movies or the works of David Lynch. We used to have one or two apas going in Vancouver. Right now, the move to electronic rather than paper publishing seems to have affected APAs. I have a couple of samples of APAplexy.

APArition, c/o Chris Roberts, is another APA in Ottawa. I have no examples of APArition.

Aurora Awards website (www.sentex.net/~dmullin/aurora/), c/o Dennis Mullin of Kitchener. For some years now Dennis has volunteered to archive records of previous Aurora Awards, post nomination and voting ballots, and list eligible candidates and nominees.

Canadian Convention Forums (www.cancons.info) is the work of one Andrew Charron.

Canadian Science Fiction and Fantasy Discussion Forum (www.pippin.ca/cgi-bin/YaBB/SF/) is the work of Chris Paul, and usually announces new publications.

www.Canfancyclopedia.ca, c/o R. Graeme Cameron of Coquitlam. Our Fearless Leader took it upon himself to archive historical material about Canadian fandom on this website. It seemed like a good idea that new fans should know who the Big Names of current and past fandom were, like the late lamented Susan Wood, who taught science fiction classes to the likes of Stan Hyde and William Gibson. At the least, background information should be available and accessible.

Comicopia (http://www.comicopia.net) is another APA, dedicated to comics, of the existence of which I was just recently advised. This year is the fifteenth year of Comicopia's continued publication.

Covert Communications from Zeta Corvi, c/o Andrew Murdoch of 9211 Glendower Drive, Richmond, BC V7A 2Y4 (email now *), is an occasional personalzine which also features some fan news. However, this fanzine hasn't come out in a while, due to Life Interfering. (Last issue was ... when?)

www.Fandom.ca, also c/o Andrew Murdoch, is Andrew's valiant attempt to keep fandom in the hands of fans, rather than the kind of mundanes who think everything is a money-making enterprise.

The Fredericton SF Society website (www.wallscrawls.com/fsfs/html/cont.htm) is a club website maintained in Fredericton, New Brunswick.

The Made in Canada website (www.geocities.com/canadian sf/), c/o Don Bassie of Ontario, is a resource for tracking new releases by Canadian authors, artists, and filmmakers.

Opuntia, c/o Dale Speirs, P.O. Box 6830, Calgary, AB T2P 2E7, is a curious personalzine from the only fanzine fan currently publishing in Calgary. Different issues of this 8.5" x 5.5" digest have fractional numbers (e.g. 55.1, 55.3, 55.5); whole numbers and fractional numbers mainly feature different kinds of content, such as fanhistories, letters, fanzine reviews or personal journalism.

The Ottawa SF Society website (http://osfs.ncf.ca) is in the care of Liz Holden, webmistress.

The Royal Swiss Navy Gazette, c/o Garth Spencer, P.O. Box 15335, VMPO. Vancouver, BC V6B 5B1, is Garth's irregular personalzine and humour magazine. The running gag about the Royal Swiss Navy is that they are a semi-fictitious fan group, they send up various absurdities that mundanes take Dead Seriously, and they campaign against terrorism with humorism, with making it look silly, with extrapolating its consequences to ridiculous lengths. No-one quite seems to grasp this. (Last 2004 issue: #12, July 2004)

A fan fund, for those of you unfamiliar with the term, is a travel fund for well-known fans to visit other fans; this dates back to the 1950s, when most fans were corresponding with other and reading each other's fanzines, and when travel was a lot more expensive relative to incomes.
